THREE EXISTING MATURE PECAN TREES, RARE IN THIS PART OF SAN DIEGO, JUST NORTH OF DOWNTOWN, WERE CRITICAL IN ORGANIZING THIS SITE. TO ACCOMMODATE THEM THE HOUSE WAS DESIGNED AS A LONG NARROW BAR AT THE WESTERN EDGE OF THE LOT, OPPOSITE THE TREES. THIS ORIENTATION ALLOWED THE ARCHITECTS TO OPEN THE EAST WALL WITH LARGE EXPANSES OF GLASS AND SLIDING GLASS DOORS OPENING ONTO AN OUTDOOR ROOM WITH A FIREPLACE. THIS CALIFORNIA ROOM IS AN EXTENSION OF THE FAMILY ROOM, AND IS A PLEASANT SPOT FOR BREAKFAST AND EVENINGS BY THE FIRE.

A WIDTH OF 18 FEET FOR THE HOUSE WAS USED AS A STARTING POINT FROM WHICH TO SHIFT THE BUILDING IN AND OUT TO ACCOMMODATE FUNCTIONAL ISSUES AND THE AESTHETICS OF THE HOUSE. THE LIBRARY CUBE THAT PUSHES OUT AT THE STREET ENTRANCE CREATES PRIV ACY FOR THE OPEN EAST FACADE AND ALSO SERVES AS AN ANCHOR FOR THE LONG TWO-STORY MASS. ABOVE THE LIBRARY IS A DECK OFF THE MASTER BEDROOM. A 5-FOOT MODULE WAS USED TO ORGANIZE THE 75-FOOT LENGTH OF THE HOUSE.
